As an Auditor, You Will...

INVESTIGATE.

Auditors review financial reports and records to ensure programs comply with federal codes and regulations. Auditors work independently and as part of a group, presenting facts and data to inform agency actions.

REPORT.

Auditors interpret data and draw conclusions from internal agency records, information, and financial systems. In OFR, auditors present their findings in reports to leadership in CDC and the Department of Health and Human Services.

RECOMMEND.

Auditors recommend improvements if necessary. Auditors' objective, ethical approval assures that agency systems and procedures are in good standing.
